

A MOMENT TO TAKE FLIGHT

El Valor hosted its 11th Annual Monarch Butterfly Celebration at the Carlos Cantu Children & Family Center, bringing families and community members together for a monarch butterfly release marking the beginning of the species' annual migration south. The release served as a shared moment of reflection, connection, and celebration of nature within the community.



The celebration brought together families, community partners, and local leaders, including Celina Villanueva and Eira L. Corral Sepúlveda, and was supported by partners such as Wintrust and the Little Village Chamber of Commerce. Media coverage from ABC 7 Chicago, featuring Jaisol Martinez, helped highlight the importance of monarch conservation and community based environmental education.

GROWING ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDS



El Valor's Monarch Butterfly Conservation Program is an agencywide initiative that integrates environmental education across programs serving children, adults, and families. Through a STEAM based curriculum, participants engage in hands on learning about the monarch lifecycle, habitat preservation, and the cultural significance of monarchs, particularly within Mexican and Latin American traditions. The program fosters environmental stewardship and curiosity while creating meaningful learning experiences for participants of all abilities.

TEAMWORK STARTS EARLY

El Valor launched a new partnership with Chicago Fire FC through its Chicago Fire Soccer in the Community program, providing early exposure to sports and teamwork for children ages 3 to 5. Chicago Fire coaches led three interactive sessions that introduced basic soccer skills, encouraged cooperation, and fostered confidence and joy through movement and play.

The partnership also extended beyond the classroom, with El Valor families receiving tickets to attend a Chicago Fire FC match, offering an opportunity to experience professional soccer together and strengthen family connections through a shared community experience.

LITTLE DRIVERS, BIG DREAMS

El Valor's Annual Auto Show is a hands-on tradition designed to bring the excitement of the Chicago Auto Show experience to young learners. The event engages children and their families in creative play as children build their own cars, participate in center-wide parades, and explore interactive stations such as car washes, gas stations, banks, and ticket booths.

Through imaginative play and family participation, the Auto Show supports early learning, encourages creativity, and helps children explore real-world concepts in a fun and engaging way.

GROW UP GREAT IN ACTION

Through PNC's Grow Up Great initiative, El Valor welcomed PNC volunteers to multiple Children & Family Centers, including the Cicero Children & Family Center, for hands on engagement with young learners. Volunteers supported classrooms by reading stories, leading art activities, planting gardens, and spending time with children ages 3 to 5, reinforcing the importance of play based learning and early childhood development.

The partnership also included donations of books, gift cards, and classroom resources that helped promote early literacy and enrich learning environments across El Valor's programs. PNC Grow Up Great continues to support opportunities that nurture curiosity, confidence, and a lifelong love of learning for children and families, while strengthening community connections through sustained volunteer engagement and leadership involvement.

A NIGHT TO REMEMBER

For many teenagers, prom marks an important milestone, yet it is an experience many adults in our program did not have the opportunity to enjoy. El Valor hosted its Adult Program Prom to create that meaningful moment, offering an evening of formal attire, corsages, and dancing. Volunteers from Comcast supported the event by assisting with setup and food service, helping ensure a welcoming and celebratory experience for all participants.

TECHNOLOGY FOR INDEPENDENCE

Comcast continues to support El Valor's work with adult participants by advancing access to digital literacy and assistive technology. This partnership helps provide tools and resources that enable adults with disabilities to build technology skills, connect with others, and participate more fully in daily life.

As part of this ongoing collaboration, Maria Castro visited El Valor's Community Day Services to present a contribution supporting digital literacy programming. Investments like these help bridge the technology gap and expand opportunities for learning, independence, and inclusion for adults of all abilities.



ON THE ROAD TOGETHER

A group of adult participants took part in a weekend trip to Wisconsin Dells, where they visited a waterpark, explored the surrounding area, and spent time building connections with peers. Trips like these provide meaningful opportunities for social engagement, independence, and community involvement outside of daily routines.

The experience was made possible through public funding support championed by Javier Cervantes, whose advocacy helps expand access to inclusive and enriching experiences that enhance quality of life for adults with disabilities.

EAGLES TAKE FLIGHT

The El Valor Eagles represented the community at the Special Olympics State Summer Games, beginning the season during the Opening Ceremonies at Soldier Field. Athletes competed in track and field events, demonstrating dedication, sportsmanship, and strong team spirit throughout the competition.

Fifteen Eagles advanced to the State Games, with three athletes earning state gold medals, reflecting their commitment and hard work. Participation in Special Olympics provides adult participants with meaningful opportunities to build confidence, connection, and pride through inclusive athletic competition.

➔ CIVIC LEADERSHIP

Civic leadership at El Valor is rooted in connection, education, and participation. In addition to direct services, El Valor creates opportunities for individuals, families, and community members to engage with civic systems, build leadership skills, and better understand how decisions that affect their lives are made.

Through community forums, educational visits, and opportunities for direct dialogue with public leaders, El Valor supports participants in sharing their experiences and engaging respectfully in civic spaces. These efforts strengthen collaboration, promote self expression, and reinforce the importance of inclusive participation in shaping strong, informed communities.



VOICES AT THE TABLE

In August, El Valor hosted a Legislative Forum to bring together community leaders, neighbors, and elected officials for open dialogue and engagement. The event fostered meaningful conversation and strengthened connections between residents and policymakers. Attendees included Senator Celina Villanueva, Representative Edgar Gonzalez, Representative Theresa Mah, Commissioner Alma E. Anaya, Alderperson Michael D. Rodriguez.



PARTICIPATION IN PRACTICE

Throughout the year, El Valor travels to Springfield to engage directly with state leaders and elevate the voices of those served. Mothers from El Valor's Children's Programs participate in these visits, gaining skills to speak on behalf of their children and families. Adults from El Valor's adult programs also take part, sharing their experiences and speaking up for their rights. Staff members regularly meet with elected officials to seek continued program funding and to share the outcomes and impact of El Valor's work, ensuring that community priorities are clearly communicated at the state level.

During the visit, participants met with Javier Cervantes, Lisa Hernandez, Theresa Mah, Abdelnasser Rashid, Edgar Gonzalez Jr., Curtis J. Tarver II, and Celina Villanueva. These efforts encouraged participation and reinforced El Valor's commitment to leadership, engagement, and constructive community involvement.

LEARNING STARTS HERE

Local partners, including the Latin American Motorcycle Association - Chicago West, Sembra Chicago, Senator Cervantes, Tropical Optical, and Constellation, helped provide backpacks filled with school supplies for children at El Valor. These contributions supported families in preparing for the school year, ensuring children have the essentials they need to start the year ready to learn.

ROLLING INTO THE SCHOOL YEAR

LAMA Chicago-West returned to El Valor for the 15th Annual Pen and Pencil Drive at the Carlos Cantu Children & Family Center, delivering school supplies to support young learners as they prepared for the new school year. More than 100 backpacks filled with essential supplies were distributed to children ages eight and under, with over 60 riders participating in the delivery and community celebration.

The event combined practical support with joyful experiences, including opportunities for children to interact with riders and take photos on motorcycles. Additional book donations from Piper Elementary School helped further promote early literacy and learning readiness for children and families served through El Valor's programs.

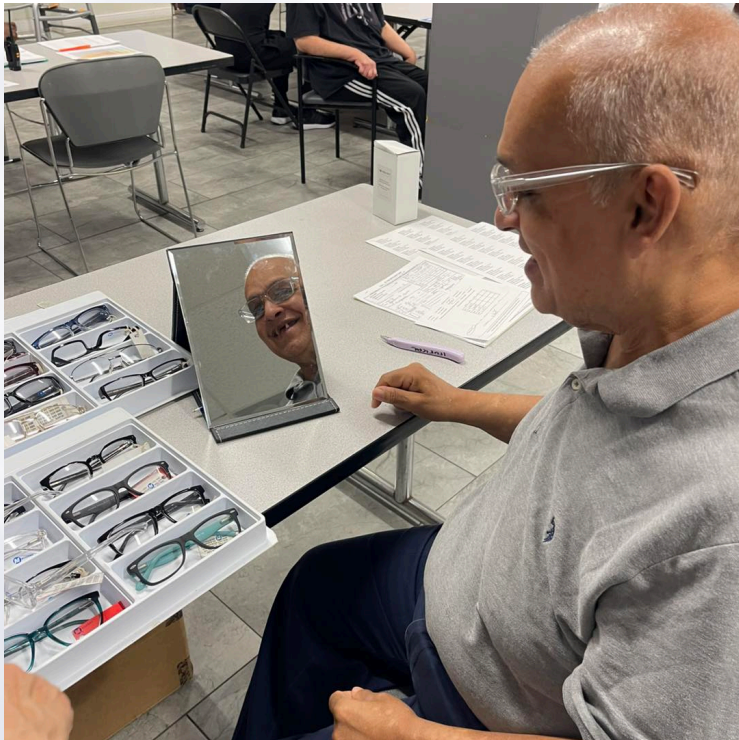


EQUIPPED TO LEARN

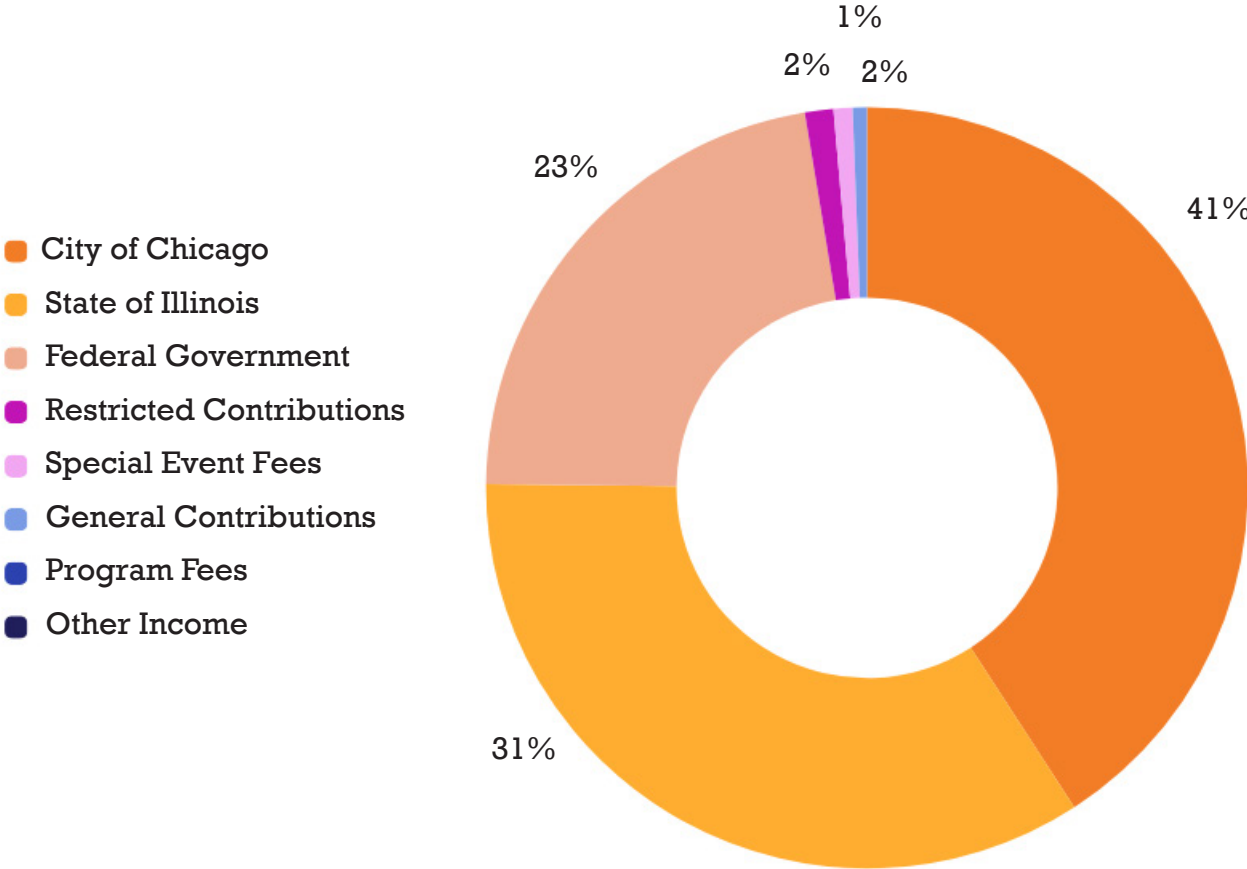

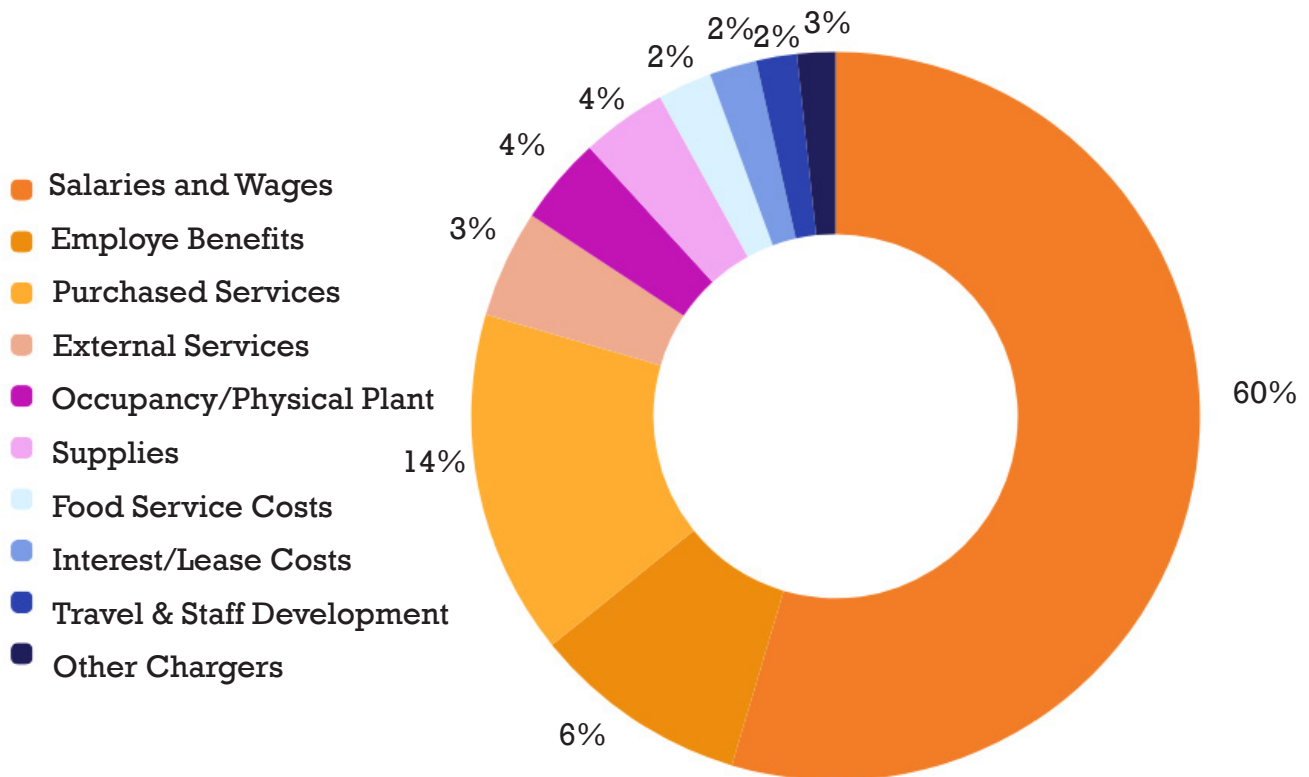
